




For 40 years the Graduate School—and the 125,000 students who have studied there—have recognized this fact.


This year the faculty of 325 and the student enrollment of approximately 10,000 have again given meaning to this credo:

A Correspondence Program that offers government field employees a choice of 22 courses ranging from Report Writing to Review of Engineering Fundamentals.




A Special Day Program tailored to meet the specific needs of an agency or group of agencies.

It is an organization that has no endowment •
and receives no Government funds, although
the Department of Agriculture and other
Government agencies provide office space
and classrooms.

Fees are nominal, averaging \$24 a course •

The Civil Service Commission accepts Graduate •
School credits for examination and
qualification purposes on the same basis as
those from accredited colleges and
universities.

Because degrees are not given, there is a •
freer choice of courses, which permits broad
flexibility in arranging and selecting classes.
(However, many colleges and universities
do accept Graduate School credits.)
